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### **Background and Motivation**

Evidence-based policymaking is a pillar of social and economic development across the world and in Qatar. Decisionmakers in industry and the public sector have access to an enormous amount of information, and detailed statistics on economics and current events are updated on an almost daily basis. Both types of information are beneficial for effective policy-making. However, current and trustworthy information about the views, attitudes, and behaviors of ordinary people are often less readily available. While leaders may be able to sense the state of public opinion or tendencies in mass behavior with regard to specific questions or policies, unless they have reliable, objective data on these phenomena along with a valid basis for temporal or cross-societal comparison, they can be forced to rely on intuition in judging the policy-relevance of these perceived attitudes and trends.

Since its establishment in 2009, the Social and Economic Survey Research Institute (SESRI) at Qatar University has helped inform social and economic development in Qatar through the design and implemented of dozens of studies based on state of the art survey research techniques. Backed by rigorous social science and intimate knowledge of the local context, SESRI has produced and disseminated impartial, empirically-based research results offering previously-unavailable insights for use by governmental organizations, policymakers, companies, media, the public, and the international community. This virtual research symposium will showcase SESRI’s latest projects and findings and their implications for national development in Qatar against the backdrop of the lingering Covid-19 pandemic.
