'Family physicians vital for success of healthcare'

I stablishing doctors' clusies led by family ophysicians is vital to the continued success of health-care in Qatar, a new study by researchers at Well Cornell Medical College in Qatar (WCMC-Q-) has said.

An increase in the population from the current 2m to 2.5m by 2020, a spedicted by Qatar Statistics Authority, means family medicine will be of paramount importance in the future and that given is likely to be a "significant evolution" in the primary healthcare system.
